How the COVID-19 pandemic is inspiring ELCIC members to adapt and find new ways to live out the call to be In Mission for Others

2020 has been a challenging year for all. The COVID-19 pandemic has changed how we function in our day-to-day lives drastically. Working from home is a reality for many. Visits have become phone calls. Gym memberships have turned into home workouts. And traditional church worship has also been impacted.

When the first wave of this reality started to impact us here in Canada in the middle of March 2020, we saw many congregations turn from

grieving the loss of gathering together in person to exploring new ways of connecting with church members and the wider community, while ensuring physical distancing strategies were maintained and those who were vulnerable were protected.

It hasn't always been easy but across the church—coast to coast to coast—we are finding new ways to come together as community.





When COVID-19 drives us out—we drive in!

As the world unexpectedly embraced the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic, New Denmark Lutheran Parish, New Brunswick (comprised of St. Peter's and Bethany), adapted to the challenging circumstances before them.

Social distancing measures closed the door on in-person worship, and poor bandwidth allocation made virtual worship extremely challenging. In light of this, an adaptive and alternative approach was taken: drive-in style worship services. In the beginning it was an adventure filled with newness and uncertainty, but it quickly shaped into an enjoyable means of gathering and worshipping together while maintaining social distancing protocols.

Rather than focus on what the pandemic has prohibited, we strive to focus on the new opportunities that it creates! COVID-19 attempted to drive us out of our buildings, but has instead driven us into a wonderful opportunity for people of all ages and skill-sets to work collectively in the service of Christ and the church.





Virtual Vacation Bible School

As many worship services had to adapt over 2020 to allow for virtual options, so too has Vacation Bible School (VBS). Christ, Regina approached this with open hearts and minds using the approach from *Illustrated Ministry's* Compassion Camp—looking beyond ourselves in compassion for others.

Compassion Camp consists of five sessions with the same format
—a Bible story, singing, crafts, games, yoga, colouring and reflection

on the session's Bible story.

Each session began with the leader putting on their "compassion glasses," enabling them to see and greet the VBS participants in their homes.

Both parents and grandparents participated with their children and the feedback showed virtual VBS was well received.

January 2021

Dear Beloved in Christ,



May grace and peace be yours in abundance (1 Peter 1:2a).

I send you greetings in the Name of the One who is the light of the world, Jesus our Lord, as you gather for your Annual General Congregational Meeting.

These past months have been a season of incredible change.

Our patterns of life, as we have known them, continue to be disrupted and there is much anxiety around and within us. There is an increased awareness of many issues in our lives, our communities, and world, which for many had existed unobserved, silent, hidden, ignored. Employment needs, violence, mental health concerns, food security issues, racism, climate change, deaths, losses of many kinds....

At the same time, these past months have accelerated the movement of the church into profoundly adaptive changes and challenges and opportunities, which needed to be addressed in order to be vital communities of witness to Jesus in the 21st century.

I am realizing that the "new normal" is not something we have to still envisage in a time to come; the new normal is already among us.

There are new opportunities and possibilities before us, including recommitting to a missional model of listening, discerning, experimenting, reflecting, and learning, while continuing to ask the questions: where is God in our neighborhood? our community? our world? And equally important: how might we join God in God's mission?

I continue to be grateful and encouraged by the amazing resilience of congregational leaders, lay and rostered who under extraordinary stress, pressure and restraints have poured themselves into the work of leadership; and though tired and weary and wondering, have reached out to one another, and to those in their midst, providing pastoral care, connection, compassion and care.

And our synod and church, working together in ways that witness to the Spirit of God among us. The Day of Pentecost synod-wide video and the Reign of Christ synod-wide worship service. Joint correspondence from national and synod treasurers, and from national and synod bishops. Sharing of resources and experience.

Creativity, ingenuity, openness, support, encouragement, trust, community.

I urge you, during your Annual General Meeting, and at other times, to continue to be in conversation together. Conversation as lay and rostered leaders and congregational members, as well as across your Synodical Area and together throughout our Synod.

I offer the following questions again for reflection and discussion. In considering these questions, keep in mind not just worship, but spiritual life, faith formation, service to the neighbor, and relationships in general as the body of Christ along the continuum that includes both physical and digitally mediated presence to one another.

What is God calling us to be and do in the time ahead? What is God's purpose for us – what is God's mission through us – moving forward?

What have we learned during the past months about what is important in our life together as the body of Christ? How might we use this knowledge to shape how we will live, work, and serve together? What might we bring into the future from this experience?

What new skills have we learned? What other skills and gifts will we need to embrace a new future?

How might our theological, denomination, and biblical perspective and traditions inform how we move forward?

What are the things that seemed so important before the coronavirus crisis that we might give less attention to, or let go of, altogether?

When you meet, you will be making decisions about your priorities for ministry. You will be adopting budgets that enable ministry that joins in God's mission of reconciliation in the world. You will be supporting your partners in ministry – the rostered ministers of this Synod, and especially those who serve among you as they, first and foremost, seek to equip you for the work of ministry: the building up of the Body of Christ.

Joining God's mission means that your ministry is among the people with whom you live and move and have your being. Your ministry is done each day in the living out of your baptismal identity as God's beloved children through your service in word and deed.

Ministry continues beyond the neighborhood and congregation through the many faces of the church and many facets of its ministries: our Synod and its staff, our National Church expression, the Lutheran World Federation, En Misión con El Salvador: In Mission with El Salvador, and our Companion Synod – The Evangelical Lutheran Church of Colombia.

As you gather be sure to join others across the Synod as you:

As we journey together join me in prayer. Continue to be humble and gentle with one another. Honor each other. Make space for lament. Welcome moments of joy. Help each other live into hope. Learn from this journey in the coronavirus wilderness and let the learning lead us forward. Trust that God is at work in this time and look for the new things God is doing even now.

Thank you for your witness to patient trust in God and to sacrificial, cruciform love for your neighbors.

Know that I continue to be inspired and excited by the creative ways in which you have proclaimed the Gospel, offered pastoral care, knit together the body of Christ, and served the neighbor in our current reality.

Know that you are held in prayer.

Most importantly, know that God is with you and even now is planning and nourishing seeds of resurrection life.

EDUCATION AND YOUTH COMMITTEE REPORT January 2021

The year 2020 was no regular year. In March, the Government of Alberta implemented restrictions to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 (a contagious disease caused by severe acute respiratory syndrome coronavirus 2). This led to the cancellation of many activities in our church.

The Government of Alberta and Alberta Health Services provided guidelines for organizations to follow during the COVID-19 pandemic. The Education and Youth Committee recommended that our Sunday School classes should not resume until there was enough evidence that we could operate safely during the pandemic. We waited until our public schools successfully transitioned back to a "new normal." Then, our Sunday School Superintendents – Sherrilyn Spencer and Candace Swanson – recommended our own set of guidelines to supplement the ones given by the Government of Alberta and Alberta Health Services. With the support and encouragement of Pastor Paul and the Congregational Council, Sunday School was able to re-start on November 29.

Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, our annual Vacation Bible School and our Christmas Concert were cancelled in 2020.

The Education Committee would like to thank Pastor Paul, the Sunday School Superintendents (Sherrilyn Spencer and Candace Swanson), the members of our Congregational Council, and the volunteer Sunday School teachers. They have worked so hard to provide educational programming for our children.

Sunday School Superintendent Report 2020

Sunday school started in the new year on Jan. 12, 2020 and we were able to hold 8 Sunday classes and 1 craft Sunday before Sunday school was suspended in March due to COVID 19, ending our 2019-20 Sunday School year early.

The start to the 2020-21 Sunday School year was delayed due as a precaution this fall. It was decided that we would monitor the return to school until after Thanksgivings and then re-evaluate. Following AHS guidelines, Sunday School officially started on Nov.29 with the plan to get in 4 advent lessons in prior to Christmas. We did not schedule a craft Sunday for Christmas as they present increased challenges to adhere to the COVID guidelines. We have 16 children on the roster this fall, supported by 6 teachers. We continue to have the students divided into 2 classes – one class for children ages 3 to grade 3 and one class for children in grades 4-6.

This was the 3rd year using a Sunday school curriculum by Spark House called "Holy Moly". This year, students continued to work through lessons from the New Testament as well as 4 lessons for Advent and 4 lessons for Easter. Each "Holy Moly" lesson introduces kids to a specific Bible story by watching an animated Bible story video, having them hear the story from their storybooks (primary class) or bibles (gr. 3-6 class) and then participate in a hands-on activity in their leaflet.

Due to COVID, our 2019/20 year-end celebration, VBS and the 2020 Christmas program were not held this year.

We continue to be grateful for the support of so many people who contribute to making the Sunday School Program successful, to the great benefit of our children. We would not be able to offer such an engaging and diverse program without our students, parents, volunteer teachers and congregation. Through the efforts of so many, our young people have the opportunity to learn about the word of God in a variety of ways while witnessing the love of God through these volunteers. We are also thankful for Pastor Paul, Brad Pylypow and council's guidance and support through the challenges of this unique year.

Pastor's Report for 2020

In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. 2 Timothy 4:1-2

Is a global pandemic a favorable or an unfavorable time to proclaim the message? I think the jury is still deliberating. Meanwhile, we persisted, and delivered the message in new ways. As we consider what to do in the future, here are the highlights of what we have done in the recent past:

Outreach:

We made the difficult decision to shelve Vacation Bible School for 2020, due to the extreme difficulty of keeping 100+ children safe in close quarters. We did, however, hold our fifth Free Garage Sale outdoors on Friday September 6, and it was a success from the standpoint of number of items given to new homes, number of people participating, and small quantity of material to the landfill. When allowed, we continued to offer the use of our building to the Girl Guides and private tutors. And before the capability was taken away from us in March, we provided hospitality at funeral luncheons for Archie Merriman and Norman Bertram.

Wider Church:

No conventions were scheduled in 2020 due to our new triennial cycle. However many Zoom meetings of various clusters of ministers took place! The National Church's program *Living Our Faith* switched from a focus on prayer to a focus on bible study in September.

Education:

Thanks to our Sunday School superintendents, teachers, and volunteers for their efforts in teaching the regular way until March, and then restarting the Sunday School with enhanced safety procedures in November. Confirmation class currently has 1 second year student and 2 first year students working through a new curriculum. We were unable to celebrate the confirmation of two confirmands in 2020, so that celebration is still pending. Bible study was terminated at Hillcrest Lodge and the nursing home in March, but restarted at the nursing home in October – we are using the book suggestions from *Living Our* Faith for this study, which is also offered on-line.

Worship:

It is almost useless to calculate the average Sunday morning worship attendance for 2020! The building stood empty for the months of April-June, including Good Friday and Easter Sunday, while audio pre-recordings of services were placed on the website, and for several weeks, we experimented with live Zoom worship. Functionality was built into the website in August to track the number of on-line "listeners", so we now have an idea of its usage. Our Lenten sermon series was on "Prayer" by Dr. O. Hallesby, and this year we also had a summer sermon series on "Duty and Sacrifice." We celebrated the addition of Aubree Lavigne, Perri Zmurchyk, and Cayden Ellis to God's family through baptism, and we celebrated the wedding of Ryan Kroetsch to Kiera Heintz.

Property:

Several issues were addressed in the church this year, including replacing lighting in the basement, entry, and narthex, and repairing the ceiling fan in the balcony. At the parsonage, the back door was replaced, and the deck was extended.

Personal:

Thanks for your support of my time involved with the Provost Ministerial (and food bank), and for providing the food bank storage room downstairs! And thanks for your support and words of comfort on the death of my mother, your care was deeply felt!

Outlook:

What could I have said in my Outlook for 2020 that would have made any difference this past year?! We respond to the call of the Holy Spirit in whatever circumstances we face. We hope and pray that circumstances in 2021 are more favorable, however, we stand ready to deliver the message regardless! May God guide us in 2021, such that His grace and truth communicate through everything we do, to everyone we encounter...
